

FLEXIBLE LEARNING OPTIONS

Students can take part in the program in a variety of ways. All options are free of charge to students and schools.

Individual: Individual students can visit Road to Zero during museum opening hours. No booking is required.

Self-guided: Class groups can visit Road to Zero during museum opening hours. Booking is required.

Revision session: Students can attend a free revision session during the school holidays. Led by experienced VCE HHD teachers, the revision session includes a lecture style presentation, an interactive session 'tackling tricky exam questions' and the opportunity to use the app in the Road to Zero Experience Space. Booking is required.



MORE INFORMATION ABOUT ROAD TO ZERO

Road to Zero is a world-first road safety education complex, developed by the TAC in partnership with Melbourne Museum.

Road to Zero offers free, curriculum-based programs for Year 9 and 10 (Science and Health & Physical Education), VCE and VCAL students. The Road to Zero Regional In-School Program caters for students who cannot easily attend the experience at Melbourne Museum due to distance.

ROAD TO ZERO, IN COLLABORATION WITH EXPERT VCE TEACHERS, HAS DEVELOPED A FREE LEARNING EXPERIENCE FOR VCE HEALTH AND HUMAN DEVELOPMENT (HHD) STUDENTS.

Guided by an app on their own device, the program immerses students in the digitally immersive and highly engaging environment of Road to Zero at Melbourne Museum. At the same time, the program addresses key areas of the VCE HHD study design.

By engaging in the Road to Zero app experience, students will:

- ✓ Revise key knowledge in preparation for exams and other assessment tasks.
- ✓ Use key skills and understanding to apply this knowledge to the issue of road safety.
- ✓ Prepare short answers to questions and compare against sample high-level responses.



DESCRIPTION

The app guides students through the Road to Zero Experience Space at Melbourne Museum, inviting them to apply their understanding of the Ottawa Charter for Health Promotion and the Sustainable Development Goals to the important issue of road safety.

Students complete a range of hands-on experiences, respond to short answer questions and have the opportunity to edit their responses after viewing high-level sample responses. Students are emailed a copy of the revision notes they create at Road to Zero.

The app consists of three modules:

Module 1: Action Areas

Explore Victoria's road safety health promotion strategy, and then apply the action areas of the Ottawa Charter.

Module 2: Health Promotion Strategies

Consider how Road to Zero reflects the health promotion strategies that underpin the Ottawa Charter.

Module 3: Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)

Explore how Road to Zero is working towards achieving SDG 3 key feature 'halve the number of global deaths and injuries from road traffic accidents.'

CURRICULUM LINKS

The app addresses the VCE Health and Human Development curriculum (2018-2023), specifically:

Unit 3, Area of Study 2 – Promoting health and wellbeing

- The role of health promotion in improving population health, focusing on one of: smoking, road safety, or skin cancer, including:
 - why it was/is targeted
 - effectiveness of the health promotion in improving population health
 - how the health promotion reflects the action areas of the Ottawa Charter for Health Promotion.

Key skill: apply the action areas of the Ottawa Charter for Health Promotion to a range of data and case studies.

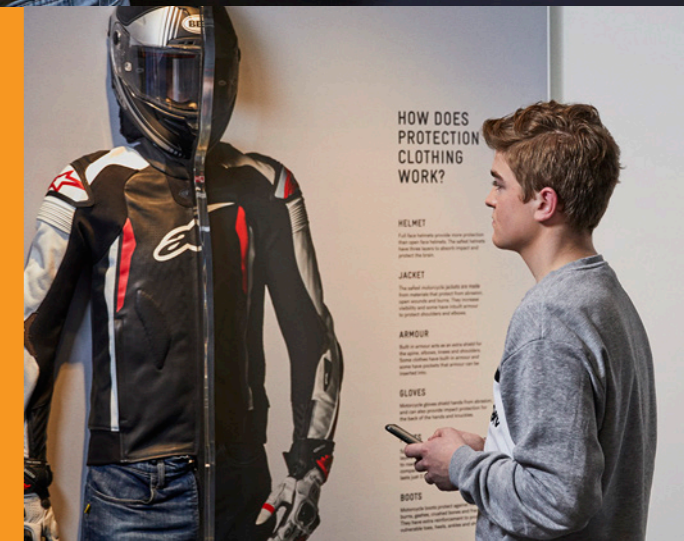
- Key features of SGD 3 'Ensure healthy lives and promote wellbeing for all at all ages.'
